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Our Students Do Evangelism

I just returned from another teaching trip to Kiev, Ukraine. As usual, our students are very attentive and focused on learning. This time I taught a class on the sacraments to our advanced students and early Medieval Church history to our new students. One student, Valery, told me that he whole Christian life was different from what he had learned in our school. He was excited to be growing and gaining a systematic understanding in biblical doctrine. It is always gratifying to see the eager faces and watch our students take careful notes during the day. Even though many of them had to flee from their hoes in eastern Ukraine, they are joyful and express deep trust in the Lord They are truly examples of trusting God's providence in the midst of struggles and hardship.

We meet in an old resort building just outside of Kiev. This supplies us with dorm rooms, classrooms, and meal service. There are quite a few works in the building with kitchen, cleaning, and maintenance staff. Our students decided to do an evangelistic outreach to this staff that works in the building One evening they invited all the staff to concert and party. Some of our students who sing and play the guitar did some Christian hymns and songs for the staff and then one of our master degree students, Anatoli, presented the gospel. The next day, a

Page Page Page kitchen worker told our administrator, Natasha, "I've tried to read the Bible, but never understood it. The way Anatoli explained it, I understood things about God and Jesus for the first time." She also told Natasha how much she liked the Christian music. Our students then spent time personally talking with the staff and answering their questions.

It was a great evangelistic time with the staff of the building. The next day in class we had prayer for the staff What is especially good about this is that our students initiated, planned, and carried out all of this on their own. They are planning to do this regularly as we meet monthly in the building. In the midst of political turmoil in Ukraine, the gospel is continuing to go forth and God is building his kingdom.

We're doing well, thanks. We had a good Lord's Day yesterday. We went to a local Baptist Church, and then I led Bible class in

our apartment with my family.

Also all students liked the classes last 2 weeks. Van, Kirk and Jim came to us teaching us: "Sacraments", "Church History", "Biblical Theology", and "Reformed Doctrines".

Last Thursday our 5 students received sms from Meest-Express that the boxes had already arrived. This morning I called Vadim and he said that he had already sent about 80 pair of socks to another Vladimir (also our student). Vladimir is going to spread socks and the Gospel of John in a military hospital in Dnepropetrovsk.

I asked the students to inform me about this ministry, and I'll inform you.

Support A Student

It is possible to support a student attending the Reformed International Theological Seminary that has relocated to Kiev. The cost per student is very reasonable by Canadian standards, yet it makes an enormous impact in the spiritual lives of these students and their churches in Ukraine. The total cost of operating the seminary in Donetsk includes renting the professors' apartment, renting seminary classroom space, translator's salaries, utilities, student stipends, desk, chairs, library and other miscellaneous expenses. At the present time we have between 80-100 good solid theological library books written in Russian for our students to use.

You can Support a Student on several different levels:

Level 1

For \$100 a month, you can fund a student's monthly stipend.

Level 2

For \$120 a month, you can fund a student's monthly stipend and cover their transportation, food and lodging for a month.

Level 3
